

Dear Friends in Jesus.

At the end of this month, we again have the opportunity to observe the Sunday of the Passion/Palm Sunday, as well as the "Three Days" or "Triduum" – the ancient title for the period that begins on Maundy Thursday evening and ends on Easter Sunday evening.

On the Sunday of the Passion/Palm Sunday, March 24, our worship will include the celebration with palms (again making use of beautiful "fair trade" palm fronds that provide just compensation for small growers), as well as a dramatic reading by Vincent Lamenza of The Passion of Jesus According to St. Luke.

The Three Days begin four days later, on March 28, as we Christians focus on the very core of our faith – the suffering, death, and resurrection of Jesus. From ancient times, the Three Days have been understood as one continuous period of worship. This means, for one thing, that our worship on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday evenings ends without the usual Benediction – we're really not ending our worship, after all, merely taking a pause. This also means, much more importantly, that our being in worship on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday evenings, is just as important as our being in worship on Easter Sunday morning. Our schedule of worship and related activities for the Three Days will be as follows:

Maundy Thursday, March 28
At 7:00 P.M., we will gather for a Liturgy of Holy Communion, sharing in the mystery and the meaning of that Upper Room – the body and the blood given for us – the betrayal and desertion of our Lord. Reflecting that betrayal and desertion, our worship will end with the solemn stripping of the altar by members of altar guild as the senior choir intones the haunting words of Psalm 22.

Good Friday, March 29

At 7:00 P.M., we will gather for the Liturgy of Good Friday – a dark and solemn time featuring a dramatic reading of The Passion of Jesus According to St. John. Please note that Youth Group members will again read the principal parts of The Passion, getting together for a short "rehearsal" at 6:15 P.M. Please support them with your presence!

Holy Saturday, March 30

At 9:00 A.M., members of Youth Group will gather to set up for our annual Easter Egg Hunt, with the hunt getting underway at 10:00 A.M. for children in four age groups: preschool, grades K-1, grades 2-3, and grades 4-5.

At 7:00 P.M., we will continue our worship <u>downstairs</u> with a Liturgy of Readings and Prayer. This liturgy, a part of the Liturgy of Easter Vigil, features a series of lengthy readings from the Old Testament, telling of the creative and saving actions of God, beginning with Genesis 1, that point the way to the ultimate creative and saving action of Easter. There will be no music and no offering — only my reading by the light of a single candle, silence for meditation, and prayer.

The Resurrection of Our Lord, Easter Day, March 31

Following Easter Sunday tradition at St. John, a very brief Sunrise Worship will take place outdoors (weather permitting) from 6:30 – 6:45 A.M. From 6:45 – 7:00, all interested men of the church will prepare and set up for Easter breakfast, which will be served from 7:00 – 8:00. Following some clean-up time, and a Men's Choir rehearsal at 8:15, the annual Sunday School Easter Party, for all ages, will follow at 9:00. Our morning will conclude with a Liturgy of Holy Communion, featuring the great hymns of Easter, at 10:15 A.M. A special musical prelude, featuring our choirs, will precede this worship, so please plan to come approximately 15 minutes early.

Please don't miss your opportunity to fully take part in this holiest of Christian holy times!

Bishop's Message for Lent - 2013

Dear Co-laborers with Christ.

Each summer for many years now, our family has traveled to a favorite vacation spot, a cottage on a lake in the heart of the Adirondack Mountains of upstate New York. From our home in New Cumberland, it is a driving distance of about 400 miles to our destination. Often we made the journey in one day, at least a total of eight hours of driving, mostly on interstate highways until the turn onto the last one hundred miles of scenic two-lane road cutting across the Mohawk Valley and into the mountains north of Cooperstown. It has always been worth the trip, knowing that at the end of the long drive, there will be time for relaxation, refreshment, and renewal.



In recent years, though, we have not made the hurried drive in one day. We have taken time to soak up the experience of the journey itself, breaking the trip into two days. We avoid the interstates and seek the back roads of Pennsylvania, looking for creative and often meandering routes to the New York line and beyond. We stop along the way to investigate places new to us, small towns with familiar or unfamiliar names, vistas previously missed or unseen: Centralia, Catawissa, Shickshinny, Eagles Meer, World's End and Ricketts Glen, Dimock, Sharon Springs and Canajoharie. Some of the sights are breathtakingly beautiful or touchingly quaint, while others are sad with age and depression, decay or abandonment. Along the way, we discover new sources of enrichment, new experiences, and a broader understanding of our country. The journey itself becomes an event, every bit as important to us as the destination.

The season of Lent is a journey. It lasts forty days, no matter which route we take. Along the way, we walk with Jesus through Galilee, into Samaria, on the road into Judah and ultimately to Jerusalem and Calvary. It begins with repentance and the knowledge of dim days ahead. It is a journey we make each year and, because it is familiar, might be a time we wish to skip through as lightly as we can, eager to put the dark days behind us and bask in the brightness of Easter. But the road must be traveled. The valleys and the shadows cannot be avoided. We cannot get to the empty tomb without this necessary journey.

This pilgrim journey passes through a world of beauty and opportunity, but also through valleys of death and cruelty that need to be explored. The Lenten pilgrim cannot pass by the hungry masses or those who clamor for justice and the recognition of their human dignity. Our minds and heart may be fixed on a distant horizon, but we cannot ignore or make light of the injustice, pain and deprivation we pass through on the way. Each day of the journey provides for the pilgrim tasks that must be undertaken.

We are not helpless in the face of such challenges, for we do not make the journey alone. We travel in community and Jesus walks with us. So we face the challenges on the way with hope. There is immense work to be done to restore and reconcile divided Christianity, to bring peace and understanding to those who fear and fight each other. There has to be a restoration of family life and a fostering of stable and united communities. These are tasks that involve us in all our different walks of life. But they do not distract us from our destination. In fact, it is because of our destination in Christ that we cannot ignore the tasks. The journey itself is a rich event. Let us savor it, engage in it, and grow through it, that the joy of our Easter destination may all the more astonish us with grace.



Cast on stitches in multiples of three - 54, 57, or 60. For example, if you use size 11 needles and cast on 54 stitches, 3 skeins of yarn is enough. Some yarns vary in elasticity which will affect your outcome, as will your knitting tension. If the yarn you have chosen has a multicolored stripe, be careful when tying on a new skein. Make sure the color sequence is correct. Also, tie on the new skein in the body of the shawl, instead of an edge, as the ends tend to show.

* First Row: k3, p3, to end

* Second Row:

Always start the next row with the opposite stitch of what you see.

For instance, if the first stitch on the needle is a knit, then start with a purl.

KNIT THE PURLS AND PURL THE KNITS!!!

It should NOT look like ribbing.

Note: If you cast on 57 stitches you will always start with K3

Sunday School will reinitialize another hour long program on World Hunger. This we had been doing during much of the 80's, and 90's. It was not uncommon to have 70 or more of our members and friends for the program which would than kick off our yearly start and ending the 3rd Sunday in October.

Our theme for 2013 is Lifting up the Burden of Hunger

Since World Hunger and Even North American Hunger is an ongoing thing we must always be mindful of this. We can never let down our guard relative to the challenges facing all of us. I sincerely believe this program is vital to the ELCA. They make \$1.00 go very far. A standard many governments can only be envious of.

As your coordinator I am very proud of your participation and support provided for this program over the years and must give you a special Thank You for a job, not yet completed but never the less well done since 1979.

I was initially approached by Pastor Krenz to spearhead this program for our church. Having spent over 21 years in the active US Navy Destroyer Fleet from 1957 through 1976 I had seen World Hunger (WH) and destitution in more than 35 countries and well over 50 major cities in many parts of the world excluding South America. Sights and hardships like I seen 1st hand will be with me until the Lord calls me home. I was frequently a soft touch for the many children who would come up to us, while on liberty, looking for a small donation of their local coins or US coins if you had some.

Over the years your Sunday school would initiate an hour long WH kick off program some time during the Start of Lent. These would frequently include a meaningful service, appropriate hymns, prayer and scripture to the WH theme of the day, films and skits acted out by the children and teacher leadership.

We extend an invitation to our church and Sunday school members to join us on March 10, 2013 to kick off this new but old event. You will not be disappointed.
