

Dear Friends in Jesus,

As you have hopefully already been hearing, in 2017 the world will mark the 500th Anniversary of the beginning of *The Reformation*, traditionally dated from October 31, 1517, when our own Martin Luther posted his 95 Theses on the church door in Wittenberg, Germany.

You may recall that Brother Martin, as a faithful pastor in the Roman Church, was simply hoping to begin an internal process of discussion of some important issues of faithfulness, seeking God's guidance to strengthen and reform the one Roman, or Western, branch of the Christian Church, which he loved and served. (What better way to do that, he reasoned, than by posting his list of "discussion starters" on the door of a church that he knew would be filled to bursting with worshipers the very next day, the Festival of All Saints' Day?)

But it didn't turn out that way. Why it didn't turn out that way is just one of the important questions we will explore in this fall's Midweek Bible Study, which will also serve as our first congregational step in preparing for the 2017 observance.

Together, we will read and discuss a book called *The Reformation for Armchair Theologians*, which will introduce us to the key people, ideas, and events of the time, doing so with humor and without heavy and technical language. The Study will begin on Wednesday, October 14, and then will meet on subsequent Wednesdays through November 18, when we will take a break for Thanksgiving, Advent, and Christmas. Class will be held each week from 6:30 to 8:00 P.M.

As we have done the past couple of years, we will continue this fall study during our winter study time, following the beginning of the new year. (By the way, it is my vision that, next fall and winter, we will follow up on this overall study of The Reformation with a study that will zoom in on the life of Martin Luther himself – stay tuned!)

To take part beginning October 14, no previous Bible study experience is required – only an interest and enthusiasm to study, reflect on, and discuss God's Word together! So that the correct number of books can be ordered for our study, please register in advance (by speaking with me) by Sunday, October 4. If you've never given Midweek Bible Study a try, this is a perfect time to jump right in. I look forward to reading and questioning and discussing together with YOU!

BOOK DISCUSSION GROUP

Our first book discussion meeting in the spring was a great success, and we'll be reading a variety of books this year. Please join us at 2:00 pm Sunday, October 18, as we kick off our book discussions with *Life Together* by Dietrich Bonhoeffer. Bonhoeffer, a Lutheran Pastor, was imprisoned and ultimately executed for his resistance to Hitler, and Life Together is described as "a classic exploration of Christian community".

From the dust jacket:

In his book *Life Together* we learn of Pastor Bonhoeffer's experience within Christian community. This story of a unique fellowship in an underground seminary during the Nazi years reads like one of Paul's letters. It gives practical advice on how life together in Christ can be sustained in families and groups. The role of personal prayer, worship in common, everyday work, and Christian service is treated in simple, almost biblical, words. *Life Together* serves as bread to all who are hungry for the real life of Christian fellowship.

Copies of the book are available to share in our church library. Please just place the book title, your name, and the date on an index card in the wooden box to check the item out. Additional copies are available through your local library or at a bookstore. AND FOR A WALK IN THE WOODS!

Our annual "Walk in the Woods" is being planned for Sunday, October 4. The plan for this year is that we will meet at the church at 1:30 P.M. and then caravan by car up the road to the Shikellamy State Park Overlook, which provides a spectacular view of the confluence of the North and West Branches of the Susquehanna River at Sunbury and Northumberland, as well as a play area for our younger "walkers". After some time up on the hill, we will stop by the Northumberland home of the famous 18th-Century scientist, Joseph Priestley, as well as the sites of colonial Fort Augusta and the grave of Native American diplomat Shikellamy in Sunbury, with Pastor Tom providing a bit of historical background on each. Then, we will drive to the island portion of Shikellamy State Park, where we will conclude the afternoon with our traditional hot dog roast and food shared together, probably in one of the pavilions. 2016 BUDGET MEETING TO BE HELD



Over the years we have assembled 4 Enterline cousins that have graciously agreed to match all world hunger offerings received during the first 3 Sundays in October on a 1 for 1 basis. Every dollar received will be doubled that Sunday.

As your World Hunger Coordinator since 1979 you have responded very generously over those years as our compilation of statistics reveal that as of 2014 we had given \$ 80,258.00. This includes Hurricane Sandy relief of \$4600 in 2012

The ELCA World Hunger program initiated in 2011 GOD'S GLOBAL BARNYARD. Early in 2015 we once again decided to go with this theme.

As we did last year when we have a final figure for Oct,2015 we will have all teens, children and interested adults come to the Sunday School room after church service. All of you will have dollars available to choose how we are going to spend that money to buy animals, fowl or farm. Bring your ideas along with maybe your parents and as a team we will make decisions on how best we can help others somewhere in God's World that are less fortunate than we are as Americans.

Beard Leads Lutheran Disaster Responce (LDR) in our Synod

Disaster can take on many forms -- floods, fires, tornadoes, hurricanes -- but when it happens response time is critical. Our Lower Susquehanna Synod Lutherans have responded generously in the past when disaster strikes our neighbors, but lag time between when the word gets out to the congregations and when the donations get to the relief workers presents significant challenges to providing much needed assistance.

Thanks to the Always Being Made New Campaign, our synod is poised to benefit from a local Disaster Response Fund with a goal of \$100,000.00. "Having a well prepared response network within the territory of the Lower Susquehanna Synod is critical in providing quick, effective support to those who are victims of disaster, whether natural or man-made," said Glenn Beard, LDR Coordinator of Disaster Response for Lower Susquehanna Synod.

"The church is a place where countless resources are available to assist those in need. Being able to bring the resource and assets of members of our congregations to the table in a disaster response is huge," Beard said. "We are a multitalented and diverse group of people who can do incredible things when w work together. Good disaster response is always a case-study in ecumenism at its finest! Having said that LDR is recognized as a leader in disaster locally, nationally and internationally." Beard first became involved with LDR after Hurricane Katrina, leading disaster response trips to the Gulf Coast and becoming part of the Lower Susquehanna LDR Network as a member of the leadership board. Schooled by founding director of the Lower Susquehanna Network, Tim Brown, Beard was a natural choice to step in when Tim wanted to "retire" from his role as director. Then in March, Diakon, where Beard serves as Luthercare's Director of Church Relations and Pastoral Care, became the lead affiliate Social Ministry agency responsible for disaster response in our synod. It was a natural fit, and Diakon was able to make a significant commitment to LDR by affording Beard the time for his work.

When disaster strikes and a Federal disaster is declared, Beard and his team will be ready to move, starting with funds from our Synod Disaster Response Fund and quickly follow those of LDR in Chicago and other sources. Diakon, as lead affiliate agency and fuduciary agency receives the funds and distributes them for use in our synod at the request/suggestion of Beard and in consultation with Bishop Dunlop. "As we move forward it is my goal to work directly with the Deans of our synod in identifying a leader or leaders from each of the conferencesto serve on the synod's Disaster Response Network Task Force," said Beard. The group of leaders will assist in identifying local assets and other leaders from their local areas in order to develop the most prepared network of local leaders we can." Beard hopes to begin meeting with the Deans and local conference leaders this fall.

The Rev. Glenn Beard received his undergraduate degree in Special Education from Millersville University and his M.Div. from Gettysburg Seminary. He is a Board Certified Chaplin and he recently celebrated the 25th anniversary of his ordination. He served for 12 years as a parish pastor in congregations in Upper and Lower Susquehanna Synods, was a hospice chaplin for 12 years, and will be his first year here at Luthercare this fall. Beard also manages the Heidelberg Brass Band. For the first time in over 60 years the band has begun offering ite services to congregations interested in having a Polka Mass. Beard and his wife Lise were married 26 years on August 19th.

For those of you who have helped over the many years at our Congregational Yard Sale, this is where the money we raise goes to for the help with disasters. This year we raised \$1237.00 and recieved \$200.00 from Thrivent making it \$1437.00 for a total. 
