Senior Choir

After two years of COVID inactivity, we are attempting to restart our Senior Choir. The first choir rehearsal is scheduled for Tuesday, October 4th at 7:30. There are sure to be lots of questions, and probably some issues that we will deal with as they occur.

First of all, we hope that all choir members are fully vaccinated and boosted. Regarding masks, that will be each person's preference. Our congregational family will be purchasing masks which are expressly designed for singers and will have these available for each choir member if and when they would desire to wear them. These masks work better than regular masks because they are created with a chamber that allows for freedom of movement in the jaw with more distance between the mask and your mouth, thus making it easier to sing and breath with a mask in place.

I am confident with a lot of common sense and some creative thinking, we should be able to return to providing a musical addition to our worship experience. If you have any questions/concerns please contact Pastor Tom, Judy Ferree, or me. Hope to see lots of enthusiastic singers in October!

The first session of First Holy Communion Instruction with Pastor Tom, open to baptized young persons in Grade 4 or older, will be held at the church on Tuesday, October 4, from 6:30 to 8:00pm.

The October gathering of *Celebration Club with Miss Laurie* will be held in-person at the church on Wednesday, October 5, from 6:30 to 8:00 P.M.

The Property Committee meeting originally scheduled for September 13 will instead be held on Tuesday, October 11, at the church beginning at 6:15pm. (This will also serve as the committee meeting for both months.)

To help keep our elevator functioning properly, <u>please don't hold the doors open with your hand or by putting something else in the way of their closing</u>. Please be sure to instead use the "door open" button on the control panel, but do so as sparingly as possible. (The technicians who maintain our elevator report that 90%+ of the service calls they receive – whether with a high traffic elevator as at a hospital or with a limited-use elevator like ours – have to do with door alignment issues, caused by people forcing and/or holding them open.)

Our autumn session of Midweek Bible Study will get underway on Wednesday, October 12 and run for six weeks, meeting each week from 6:30 to 8:00pm and wrapping up in time for Thanksgiving Eve, Advent, and Christmas. Pending COVID developments, we will plan to meet in-person at the church, with the option for participants who would prefer to do so to "Zoom in". Our topic this fall will be Signs and Wonders: A Beginner's Guide to the Miracles of Jesus by Dr. Amy-Jill Levine, in which she explores selected miracles of Jesus (such as the Raising of Lazarus) in their historical and theological context, looking at how past witnesses would have understood the events as well as how we today can draw meaning from Jesus's words and actions. Celebrated New Testament professor and scholar Dr Amy-Jill "AJ" Levine was the first Jewish person to teach New Testament at the Pontifical Biblical Institute in Rome and describes herself as "an unorthodox member of an Orthodox synagogue and a Yankee Jewish feminist who until 2021 taught New Testament in a Christian divinity school (Vanderbilt) in the buckle of the Bible Belt". As always with these studies, no previous Bible study experience is required - only an interest and enthusiasm to study, reflect on, and (if and when you are comfortable doing so) discuss God's Word together! So that the correct number of study books can be ordered for our study, please register in advance (by speaking with Pastor Tom) by the end of the morning on Sunday, October 2.

Due to a scheduling conflict, the date of next year's Annual Strawberry Festival has just been moved from June 14 (as set at the Festival Wrap-Up Meeting a couple of months ago and since publicized) to Wednesday, June 7, 2023. This will apparently be the first time we have ever planned the Festival for the first Wednesday in June, so it may take some extra work on all of our parts to help folks realize it won't be the very familiar "second Wednesday in June" next year. It has been checked and confirmed that going with this earlier date won't conflict in any way with local school schedules and shouldn't cause any problems with regard to having strawberries. (The first planning meeting remains unchanged, on Tuesday, March 7, at 7:00pm here at the church.)
